I like living in the mid-west. I like four distinct seasons. The Spring warmth and reawakening of the earth, the Summer growth, Autumn harvest and yes, even the Winter's rest. There is a pattern to these seasons which remind me of the patterns of life. From the words of a wise teacher, commonly, believed to have been Solomon, come these familiar words, "for everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven," birth, growth, harvest and return to the earth. For we know that even in death, there is hope for new life, an abundant life that is beyond our greatest expectations and imaginations. There is much about that resurrected life we do not know. What we do know, is that Jesus promised to prepare that place and come for us when the time is fulfilled. I do not know about you but for me, that is reassuring. That is hopeful. That is comforting and freeing and fulfilling.

What might life look like for you to embrace the assurance of that promise? How would it free you to live more abundantly now with the promise of what is yet to come one day? Would it make you more grateful? More kind? Would it allow you to let go of the stresses of life that are out of your control anyway and embrace the promise now, reflected in a life of abundant harvest?

Each year, as the seasonal patterns shift, so do the seasons of the church year. We shift from the season of Pentecost including celebrations of Feast of All Saints and finally Christ the King and plan for Advent, the four week season before Christmas. On All Saints Sunday, we will acknowledge and give thanks for those members for whom the final season of life has come. We will read their names, sound a bell and light a candle honoring their lives and praying for the fulfillment of their resurrected hope now revealed in Jesus.

As you reflect on the church year which is coming to a close, what are the blessings for which you give thanks? What are the hopes for our future years yet to come? Each day there are signs of God's abundant blessings. Do you see them? Are you thankful for them? Do you willingly share them with others? May the last verse of a favorite hymn resonate in your heart as you give thanks for life's seasons and the one who gives life in abundance.

# **OPEN OUR HANDS** Open Our Hands

#### Are you willing to open your hands and share?

Many of us know the story of Jesus Feeding the 5,000 (John 6:1-14) and probably think about it as a story of a miracle. Which it is! We teach it as a miracle story in Sunday School and we study it as adults as a sign of God's abundant generosity. But let's think about this story from a different perspective. What if the boy had been unwilling to share? Think about this for a minute. Would the transformation and multiplication of the bread and fish, as well as the crowd occurred? Well, we don't have to wonder because we do know the boy shared and he shared all that he had.





With the boy's offering... opening his hands with his gift of food... to Jesus, at least at this moment, people are fed. Through a child, the ultimate sign of God's Kingdom is advanced as loaves are blessed, broken, and shared and all who eat are filled. Their hunger is satisfied and the abundant love of God is witnessed. What began as a meager and small offering is multiplied so that the people who once were hungry and in need, now want and need no more.

We read in John 6:8-9: "One of Jesus' disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said to him, 'Here is a boy who has five barely loaves and two fish, but what

good are those for so many people?" Andrew is correct in his question but Jesus already knew what he was going to do. We often wonder about the significance of what we are able to give, and children and youth often wonder more than adults. What we often fail to realize is that without the boy and his open hands of sharing, the community of people gathered at Jesus' feet would not have been blessed in the same way.

The boy's gift is not simply the food he was willing to share. The boy's gift is his presence in the community, his willingness to give and share, and his love in trusting Jesus. Because he opened his hands to share what he had, all the world is given a sign of what God is willing to do for the transformation of the world.

We are asked to give in many ways... at church, at work, at school, in our community, and throughout the world... and to many places. It is perhaps important to be reminded of this story. The boy's generosity is a sign that we share in God's nature. God is in us and we are in God. We give because we recognize that God, who is the giver of all good things, provides us with the things we need.



From the "storehouse of treasures" that God has provided to us, we look for ways to share from our treasures with God and with God's people. Remember the prayer we said at offering? As that prayer of offering reminds us, we give "what God has first given us – ourselves, our time, and our possessions, signs of God's gracious love."

## Salem will host "Be Like Jesus, Junior"

Salem is pleased to host the annual Be Like Jesus, Junior event for 1st-3rd graders on **Saturday, November 3, from 10am - 2pm**. This is a junior version of the 24hour servant event Salem hosts for older children each February along with leaders from other local ELCA congregations. This event includes music, craft-time, and age-appropriate, hands-on service projects. This year children will learn about the Center for the Prevention of Abuse and will assemble care kits for women and children served by the Center. They will also pack 500 nutritional snack packs for children at several District 150 schools which will be sent home on an upcoming 3-day weekend to be sure hungry children have enough to eat.

Be Like Jesus events teach children to live out the Great Commandment (Matthew 22:37-40) "Love God and love our neighbors" and to practice other faith skills on which to build a firm foundation. Some benefits experienced include: being a part of the church in action, identifying needs of others, completing hands on service projects, experiencing the larger church by making friends with children from other congregations, acting together on behalf of others, identifying spiritual gifts and learning that serving others can be great fun! Children who experience a Be Like Jesus event almost always return year after year and many go on to become junior high participants and high school leaders. They remember the friends they make in their small groups as well as their small group leaders from each event. These events give children and youth an opportunity to experience Christian community and the larger church in a way that we hope they will desire to be a part of for the rest of their lives!

## Faith for Life Outreach Project: Thomas Jefferson Christmas Food Baskets

Perhaps you have noticed, our Pajama Party for the Center for Prevention of Abuse was held a month earlier this fall. Thank you for your generosity with this project year after year. The pajamas and other supplies collected will be delivered on Monday, November 5. Canned food for Thomas Jefferson families will be collected at the Welcome Center in November 4, 11, 18, 25. Our Faith for Life students will be keeping track of the food collected all month and will work together to make 20 Christmas food baskets which they will deliver to Thomas Jefferson Families in December. Some of the items needed include:

Spaghetti and sauce, meal helpers (chicken, tuna, etc), stuffing mix, mac and cheese, instant potatoes, gravy, cereal, peanut butter, jelly, mustard, ketchup, canned food – soups, stews, chili, sloppy joes, etc, canned fruits and vegetables, canned meat – tuna, turkey, chicken, ham, crackers, instant oatmeal, hot chocolate, bar soap, toothpaste, paper towels, toliet paper & dish soap.

Keep your eye on the Outreach Bulletin Board at church on the first floor near the Welcome Center throughout the month of November. There will be tags available for you to take for specific items needed. 20 of each item is a huge amount! Thank you for helping Faith for Life students with this project. We have received feedback from that the Christmas Food Baskets mean a great deal to the families who receive them and we are so pleased to be able to continue this tradition with your generosity!

Dennis, a 72-year-old retired Marine, lives in St. Croix, U.S. Virgin Islands, where Hurricane Maria struck causing widespread destruction, power outages, loss of cell reception and access to resources. The morning after the hurricane, Dennis went to check on his house.

"When I looked up, half the roof was gone," Dennis said. "And then the rains started to fall. For weeks." Because of the holes in his roof, the interior of Dennis' home had significant water damage.

Once he moved back into his home after staying with relatives, Dennis met an employee of the Lutheran Social Services of the Virgin Islands disaster response team. He told them about the damage to his home, and soon after they came for a visit.

"I was hoping to get help from FEMA. I wasn't expecting the Lutherans," Dennis said.

Now, Dennis is getting help to rebuild his home and his life thanks to your gifts to Lutheran Disaster Response.

"The house isn't done, but how it looks now is beyond my wildest expectations. I can't imagine what it will look like when it's finished," he said.

CPR/AED/First Aid training will be held at Salem on **November 26 from noon to 4pm**. An AED (automated external defibrillator) is a portable device that checks the heart rhythm. If needed, it can send an electric shock to the heart to try to restore a normal rhythm. Salem's AED is located on the second floor near the restrooms. # UPDATE ON THE GLOBAL FARM CHALLENGE

As we have learned, family farms are a key source of food and income for most of the people in the world. Limited resources for many of these families mean they struggle to feed themselves. But through the ELCA Global Farm Challenge, families can have access to livestock, seeds, tools and training.

It doesn't cost much to help give families and communities the means to a have a sustainable way of life. As of the end of September, after one month of collecting, our Sunday School children and their families provided \$80 for the Global Farm Challenge. These monies could provide the following:



• \$20 could provide honeybees - a buzz-worthy gift! Honeybees have a growing importance as the shrinking honeybee population worldwide is especially worrisome. Beeswax can be transformed into handcrafted soaps, candles, honey and other products to create a small, sustainable business. But that's not all – we know that their mere presence on a farm means that they are pollinating plants and boosting crop growth far and wide.

• \$15 adds a rooster to the chicken coop and helps the farm grow! More chickens on the farm mean more eggs to eat and sell at the market. This gift is a great leap forward for a family struggling with hunger and poverty.

Sunday School children, as well as Junior and Senior High students, will be collecting an offering all year to support the Global Farm Challenge. The rest of us will have an opportunity to help support the ELCA in helping families and communities become sustainable. Children will be passing a "Noisy Can" collection during the Offering on the third Sunday each month at both services. All of our loose change added together can help families around the world end the cycle of hunger and poverty – for good.
