ou have no doubt heard someone say they had an "epiphany" meaning an awareness, revelation, an "aha" moment. It is a revelation moment that, according to V-8, there was a better choice to consider if only they had thought of it.

The story is told of astrologers/sages/wisemen/maji/"kings" from a faraway land who followed a star and travelled to worship who they had come to believe was a new king for all the world. They first stopped in the holy city of Jerusalem to inquire from the sitting king, Herod, "where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising and have come to pay him homage."

January 6 marks the day these eastern travelers brought their unusual gifts to lay before this anticipated one as announced by the prophets and now revealed to shepherds and kings alike. As we enter a new calendar year together, I am hopeful we will experience many "aha" moments together and that our perspective is shaped by the love of Christ who continues to make all things new. 

OPEN OUR EARS

This month, our theme is "Open our Ears ... to hear God's call and our neighbor's story" and we think of the story of the Good Samaritan. When asked what the most important commandment was, Jesus said that the greatest commandment is to "love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind" and the second to "love your neighbor as yourself". Jesus was then immediately asked who counts as a neighbor and he responds with a parable, or a story lesson that is an example for everyday life.



In the story of the Good Samaritan, from Luke 10:25-37, a man is attacked and robbed. A priest comes by and does not stop to help. A temple worker comes by and does not stop to help either. Finally, a man from Samaria comes by and he does stop to help. Samaritans and Jews did not like each other. The fact that the Samaritan was the person who stopped to helped would have had an impact on Jesus' listeners and reframes the question of "who is my neighbor."

As we contemplate this month's theme of "Open our Ears ... to hear our neighbor's story", let us keep this bible

verse in our minds: "Let us love, not in word or speech, but in truth and action" (1 John 3:18). Jesus asks us to act in love toward our neighbor...and our neighbor is anyone in need of help. As Martin Luther said, "Thus nothing could be regarded as worthier of love in the whole universe than our neighbor...now our neighbor is any human being, especially one who needs our help, as Christ interprets it in Luke." Luther's Works 27, 58 (1535)

Global Farm Challenge Update

As we have learned, family farms are a key source of food and income for most of the people in the world. Limited resources for many of these families mean they struggle to feed themselves. But through the ELCA Global Farm Challenge, families can have access to livestock, seeds, tools and training.













It doesn't cost much to help give families and communities the means to a have a sustainable way of life. Sunday School children

have been collecting an offering all year for the Global Farm Challenge. In addition, we have had two "Noise Can" collections during worship service to provide the congregation an opportunity to join this ELCA initiative. As of the end of December, we have collected almost \$1,000.

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A Look Back...


As the 2018 has drawn to a close, the Outreach Ministry Team is grateful for everyone who donated their time, money, and items to the various activities and collections this past fall. Below are some highlights!


• Malawi Book Collection: In September, almost 350 books were collected for the Grace of God Orphanage. Sunday school children helped decorate book plates for the inside cover of each book, and individuals in the Prime Time Mom's group helped place each book plate. The books were then packed in boxes and shipped off at the post office by Bill Ligon and Lois Knutson in mid-October. The books arrived in Mawali in late December!



• Pajama Collection CFPA: In October, Kappa Chi students helped prepare a "Breakfast at Dinner" for Breaking Bread to kick off the publicity for the pajama collection for the women and children staying at the Center for Prevention of Abuse. During the month, over 200 pairs of pajamas were collected along with toiletry items as well as \$400 toward the purchase of these items.

• Trunk-or-Treat: In October, thanks to the initiative of the Children, Youth, and Family team, Salem held its first trunk-or-treat event open to families from our Adopt-a-school partner, Thomas Jefferson, and the surrounding community. Fair Trade Chocolate Is Good for You!

Our chocolate is actually good for you! We hear our parishioners walk by our booth and comment on the array of candy bars that we have available to sell. Although we know many of us probably indulged for the holidays, rest assured that our chocolate is a bit different than some of the candy sold in the stores.

Here is some information from Equal Exchange, our Fair Trade provider, about the health benefits of cacao, which is a major ingredient in our chocolate bars.

- CACAO 101: Cacao is actually a fruit, which is why the beans (used to make chocolate ingredients) are so full of nutrients. Cacao is packed with fiber and antioxidants. Other ingredients used in chocolate are typically preservatives, milk, sugar and fat. This is why you want to look for a bar with a high quantity of cacao. The more cacao present, the more health benefits.
- **Heart Health:** A recent analysis of numerous studies found that people who ate dark chocolate had a reduction in blood pressure and LDL (bad) cholesterol.
- **Stroke:** A 2012 study in Sweden found that individuals who consumed chocolate had less incidence of stroke than those who did not.
- Satisfaction: In addition to satisfying your craving, Equal Exchange chocolate bars have fiber and healthy fats. Fat and fiber make you feel more full and keep you full for longer. This means that eating a few pieces of Equal Exchange chocolate will keep you satisfied for longer than if you ate 2 or 3 sugar cookies.




