

As summer fades and fall begins, it is becoming clear that change is in the air. Kids are back to school, daylight hours are shortening, evenings are cooler, fall programming is beginning and the signs of the harvest season are emerging. There will soon be leaves to rake, garden hoses to drain and roll up, fields to harvest and efforts made to prepare for the next season that will no doubt follow. Having spent my whole life in the midwest, I am fully aware of the changing seasons and the need to prepare for the changes that are inevitable. Some changes are welcomed, cooler evenings, apple cider, pumpkin spiced coffee, colored leaves, while other changes are more difficult. The same is true in life. We long to grow up but then we realize growing up comes with responsibilities and eventual health challenges and limitations. Change is part of life and how we adapt to or resist the changes can make a difference in how we are prepared for and embrace change or hide from it and be challenged by it.

I have recently considered biblical stories where God's people participated in an adventure as part of their call to follow God's plan and purpose for their benefit. Noah was instructed to build an ark in anticipation of a flood. Abram was told to "go from your country and your kindred and your father's house to the land that I will show you." Consider Jacob's dream and subsequent journey in Genesis 28 beginning at verse 10. There is the story of Jacob's family and how their family jealousy paved the way for God's provision for this special family in a foreign land during a seven-year famine eventually leading to Moses being sent to convince the Pharaoh to let God's people go. From there they wandered in the wilderness for a full generation of time before returning to the land that had been promised to Abraham and his descendants forever. All these are examples of change and adventure and many more, and it is only the first book and a half of the bible! God is a change maker from the position of an unchangeable love and passion for God's created and redeemed ones.

As the Renewing God's House project unfolds, it is clear that big changes are already in the works. In order to advance those changes, areas have had to be cleared out, walls removed and holes dug. Life at Salem is no longer business as usual. Classrooms have been moved, parking and entrances to the building have changed. Which door is available for access? How close can I park? Will there be anyone available to let me in if I do not have a key? Where is the mailbox? I participated in Salem's pre-school orientation the week before Labor Day and told parents that the next nine months will be an adventure. We will need patience, flexibility, adaptability, compatibility, and a willingness to proceed forward even when the path has either changed or is less than obvious. While change often causes anxiety, it also prepares the way for an adventure. I would like to suggest we consider the next nine months of construction work an adventure in the life of the church. Adventures are exciting, wondrous, full of surprises but also lead to new possibilities and opportunities. I encourage you to embrace the adventurous time that is underway at Salem. Not only for the renewal project, but also for the ministry opportunities that are taking place and that are yet to be determined. It is an exciting time and as one person described it, "a Kairos" time, meaning a unique and defining time. Thank you for your prayers, support

and participation on this wondrous life adventure for we know that Christ is with us and God's Spirit goes before us. This is confident hope for the journey.

# **Health Etiquette**

Many people are challenged when cold and flu season breaks out. Common questions at the church center around how to respond in worship regarding passing the peace and sharing in communion. Each person is encouraged to make their own decisions, and all are asked to respect those decisions. Shaking hands or an embrace makes the words we share far more meaningful; however, alternatives to shaking hands might be waving, nodding or fist bumps, all which convey greeting as well. When communing, especially on Sundays when distribution is by intinction (dipping the bread in the wine), it is an acceptable practice to commune with bread only. Jesus is not limited to one element or the other and is not half present if a person receives bread or wine by itself. Again, the most meaningful practice is receiving both elements; however, bread alone conveys God's promise as well. Thank you for respecting one another and alternate practices that may take place for a variety of reasons. May all we do be to the glory of God.

#### FROM THE PARISH NURSE, LORI REIMER, RN



The flu (influenza) is an infection of the respiratory tract. This is very different from what some refer to as the "stomach flu." It is caused by a virus that spreads easily from person to person. While seasonal influenza viruses are detected year-round in the United States, they are most common during the fall and winter.

When people have the flu, they usually feel worse than they do with a cold. Most people start to feel sick about two days after coming in contact with the flu virus. They might have fever, chills, headache, muscle aches,

dizziness, tiredness, cough, sore throat, runny nose, nausea, weakness, or ear pain. It spreads when people cough or sneeze out droplets that are infected with the virus and other people breathe them in. The droplets also can land on things like doorknobs or shopping carts, infecting people who touch those things.

To protect yourself from the flu and stop its spread, you need a flu vaccine. The flu shot is a form of the vaccine that you get in your arm. Some years, you can get it as a nasal spray instead. Flu vaccines are made to target three or four types of flu viruses that are most likely to make you sick during the upcoming year. You cannot get the flu from the vaccine nor will it help prevent the "stomach flu." Other preventive measures include cover your mouth and nose when coughing and sneezing, good handwashing, and stay home if you are sick.

# Worship! Why We Worship!

In addition to our regular Sunday School lessons, we will be learning why we worship, how we worship, and participating in worship. Watch for articles this year about worship – maybe it will give you reasons to pause and think about worship and how you participate.

Lutherans live in the beautiful tension of <u>and</u>. We are sinner <u>and</u> saint. We need the law that tells us about our sinfulness <u>and</u> the gospel that tells us we are forgiven by God's grace. We believe Jesus became fully human <u>and</u> is fully God. We worship in word <u>and</u> sacrament. We are gathered <u>and</u> sent. Not one or the other, but both, all – the <u>and</u> in its complexity and richness.

#### Consider this "Top Ten Reasons We Worship:"

- Because God created us to love and serve and worship God we both receive and return the deep love of God for the world.
- Because worship is one of the places in which we reliably encounter God we experience the holy in worship with real, fallible people, sacred stories, water, bread, and wine.
- Because worship is where the church comes into being as the familiar song reminds us, "The church is not a building, the church is not a steeple, the church is not a resting place, the church is a people."
- Because God calls and lead us there Lutheran Christians believe it is God who calls the assembly (gathering of believers) together through the Holy Spirit... remember Martin Luther's explanation of the third article of the Apostle's Creed in the Small Catechism?
- **Because we are forgetful people** Worship reminds us of our human brokenness and the amazing forgiveness God pours into us and our world.
- Because God speaks to us through Bible stories, our pastors, the words of a song, the sharing of the peace, when we receive communion, and when we are sent out. We listen as individuals and as a community.
- Because God feeds us at the table of Jesus with the very body and blood of Christ where all are welcome to come, eat and drink, and be nourished in a meal that we share with the saints of every time and place.
- Because the weekly pattern helps us to know, over time, who God is and who we are When we commit to a weekly practice of worship, we enter, with the assembly, into a long tradition that helps us in our struggle with life's deepest and hardest questions: Who are we? Who is God? How do we live after or in the midst of great suffering?
- Because community helps Much of Western culture tells us that spiritual life is an individual, personal concern. The Christian tradition counters this claim. We worship together in an assembly of intergenerational and diverse community.
- Because when we open ourselves to experience God's presence in worship, we also open ourselves to experience God's presence in our day-to-day lives Worship awakens us to the God who is at work in our daily lives, through us, with us, for us, and sometimes in spite of us.

# SPOTLIGHT VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT

The Center for Prevention of Abuse (CFPA) is not only a shelter for individuals experiencing abuse and violence, but has long been a partner with the school systems in educational programs to prevent abuse. CFPA especially wishes to recognize and support efforts made by groups and individuals to prevent violence and abuse. Morgan Lott, Salem member and recent graduate of Richwoods High School, describes in her own words, her efforts towards violence prevention.

Each and every person has a cause that is near and dear to their heart, whether it's ending world hunger or providing access to healthcare to the less fortunate. For me and many other young people in our world today, that cause is the prevention of gun violence. My junior year of high school at Richwoods, there was a tragic shooting at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida, and this event hit very close to home for me and a lot of my peers. Being in high school ourselves, we were all very aware of the fact that a similar tragedy could happen to us at any moment. Together with one of my best friends, Holiday Maag, we decided that we should do something to honor those who died in the shooting, as well as help prevent a tragedy like that from happening here in our own school. The first part of our project was organizing the sit-in on March 14, 2018, which was the one month anniversary of the Parkland shooting. Over 1000 of the 1200 students at Richwoods participated, along with 100 staff members. We sold t-shirts with the slogan "See Something Say Something" with the money that we raised going towards increasing security at school. The second part of the project was an all-school tv assembly, which occurred on April 20th, the 19th anniversary of the Columbine School Shooting. During this presentation, we went over important signs to look for in preventing shootings, as well as reviewing code red procedures.

While it was not our intention to receive praise for our work, our principal decided to nominate us for an award that is presented by the Center for Prevention of Abuse. This award is called the Outstanding Youth Leader in Violence Prevention Award and after submitting a video essay, we were chosen as the first winners in our school's history. It was a great honor to receive recognition for our hard work, especially from an organization that has been such an important part of our community. As students in PSD150, we had participated in many of the Center's programs, such as Keeping my Body Safe and Teen Dating Violence Prevention, and we knew the great work they do. There was a short awards ceremony where we were each given an award, and our names were put on a plaque that will be added to as more Richwoods students win the award in the future. Through this project, we were able to spread the word that young people are the future, and only we can end gun violence. This project was extremely important to me, and I am very proud of the message that we were able to share with our community and our peers with help from the Center for Prevention of Abuse.





There are many simple ways for Salem families and individuals of all ages to be a part of the fun. Trunk or Treat needs help with:

# Phase One of Renewing God's House Together Continues

It is an exciting time at Salem as we see the construction and renovation in the midst of the first phase. As of September 23, 2019, we have received \$1,350,700.10 in gift and cash contributions of the \$2,021,900.24 that has been pledged over three years for this project.
