

lans change quickly, especially in the life of a pandemic. There was hope that we could have an outdoor worship service at end of July to celebrate the conclusion of the Renewing God's House project as well as Kristen's time with us as pastoral intern and also the beginning of Maggie's time at Salem as Director of Music Ministries. Everything was in place. No rain in sight. Just heat, plenty of heat when the day before the event, the Peoria County Health Department issued a health advisory for Peoria county. Several criteria indicated a rise in confirmed cases for COVID-19 as well as contact tracing data indicating increases in risky behavior for groups and individuals and thereby the concern for yet further increase in cases for our area. Even though it was planned to practice physical distancing, require face coverings and gather outdoors, the risk seemed greater than the benefit and responding to the caution of the local health officials, the service was cancelled.

Schools are struggling to come up with consistent guidelines to allow students to safely return to classrooms. It seems likely there will be a mix of in person and virtual learning as the fall begins. Time and again, however, practices relax, gatherings and events take place, case numbers rise, reminding us that the viral threat continues. While we all long for the day we can return to gathering in person again, it is also important to practice caution and do what we can to keep one another safe. Look for Gretchen's article in this issue regarding the decision by the Faith Formation Ministry members to not return in

person for Sunday school after Labor Day but to offer monthly themed online classes in place of Sunday morning in the room classes. The hope is that this will provide families the opportunity to share this virtual classroom model together and help deepen the family conversations about faith and life in Christ.

Even though we are not gathered in person, we are still very much connected as the Body of Christ. We are still the church and we are still growing in faith and striving to be creative to fulfill the mission of being "a vibrant welcoming Lutheran community that, through the grace of Jesus Christ, is connected within by love and reaching out in hope to share the Gospel of Jesus Christ with one another, the community and the world." Love connects us and compels us to reach out and make a difference in the lives of others. Until and even when we meet in person again, may this be our focus that centers our lives in God's word so that we are fed and nourished by the love of Christ. How we gather has changed. Our mission, however, remains the same.



The Church is not closed! Salem's Children, Youth and Family team shared take home and virtual Concrete and Cranes Vacation Bible School with the community during the month of July. Each Sunday for 5 weeks, 66 pre-kindergarten through 5th grade participants received a bag filled with crafts, games, Bible stories and family activities at their home. These resources were supported with weekly on-line videos created by our junior and senior high students demonstrating the weekly themes and activities. About 80 percent of this year's VBS participants were guests from the community which is consistent with previous years. Weekly themes included: Building a Foundation of Love, Forgiveness, Worth, Promise, and Jesus is my Foundation for Life. We received great feedback from both parents and children who were excited to receive their bags each week. We were delighted to provide faith formation resources for use at home. 

FAITH FORMATION athome

There will be Sunday School this fall... we are going virtual! The Faith Formation Committee is working on bringing virtual faith resources to your family for the fall. Sunday School for preschool-high school will be monthly packets for families to do together. Planning is underway so watch your *Bugle Blast* for more information. Similar to our VBS this summer, packets will include everything

a family needs to grow in faith together.

Perhaps it is helpful to remember Martin Luther's belief that faith formation begins at home. Luther strongly supported parents in their work of passing on the faith to their children. Luther believed if the next generation is to be able

to proclaim the grace of God in Christ, they must first experience it at home through their parents. Salem is here to support its members in their faith formation this fall as we continue in our virtual experiences.

Martin Luther loved children. One might say that he himself retained a somewhat childlike quality, as demonstrated in his sense of humor. Certainly, he regarded being "childlike" as an extremely important characteristic in the Christian when it came to matters of faith. Luther spoke of the basic catechetical faith (the 10 Commandments, the Creed, and the Lord's Prayer) as something he never fully mastered, of being like a

little child in his need of instruction, and of learning with his own children when he prayed with them each day. He said, "I must still read and study the Catechism daily, yet I cannot master it as I wish, but must remain a child and pupil of the Catechism, and I do it gladly." Let us all be "childlike" in our journey to study God's word and to remain ever "wide-eyed"

and in wonder of what we may learn in our studies!

We plan to kick-off the Sunday School year on Rally Sunday, September 13 with a big Zoom get together. The plan is to also meet one Sunday a month for family Sunday

School Zoom time! These will be led by Sunday School teachers and staff. This is one way to stay connected and so we can see each other in a virtual way. This time will be filled with Bible stories, songs, and games!

These are challenging times and we don't know what the future will look like. But we trust in God to love and lead and guide us. As we continue to worship and practice our faith virtually, we are still the church. We show our love for our neighbor by staying physically apart but remain together in our faith and love of God.

Some scripture that we can prayerfully meditate on the Word of God:

"And so we know and believes the love God has for us. God is love. Whoever abides in love abides in God, and God abides in them." 1 John 4:16

"I must still read and study the Catechism

Allow yourself to be an instrument of God's love and share it with others!

They will be like a tree planted by the water that sends out its roots by the stream and does not fear when heat comes; for its leaves remain green and is not anxious in the year of drought; for it does not cease to bear fruit." Jeremiah 17:7-8



At this point, what the school year will look like is uncertain. Whether at home or in school, staying active, eating nutritiously, and promoting strong mental health are important for children's development. These will help to better manage stressors, prevent disease and boosts the immune system, and create a healthy environment at home or school.

- · Do fun family physical activities, set goals for the week
- \cdot Do a scavenger hunt at home or in your neighborhood
- \cdot Play "old school" games like hopscotch, jump rope, or tag

Eat right:

- · Start with a healthy breakfast, have easy and nutritious snacks available
- · Introduce new foods in a fun way
- · Grow your own vegetables
- · Cook together and incorporate nutrition education

Promote mental health:

- · Family conversations about feelings
- · Express feelings through art or journaling
- · Learn basic mindfulness
- · Create a letter writing tradition within the family



Book Club

Join your fellow Salem members in a book club. Gretchen Petrakis will lead the discussion for the book group. The format will be as follows:

The book for August Book Club, facilitated by Gretchen Petrakis, is "I'm Still Here - Black Dignity in a World Made for Whiteness" by Austin Channing Brown. The author is a writer, speaker, and practitioner who helps schools, nonprofits, and religions organization practice genuine inclusion. Her writing has appeared in outlets such as Christianity Today, Relevant, Sojourners, and The Christian Century. It has been a choice recently on many popular online book club groups. The book group meets on Zoom on a night meeting the last week of the month to discuss the book. We would love to have you join us!

This is not an easy book and parts will be hard to read as a white person. Austin Channing Brown writes in "breathtaking detail about her journey (yes, it's a memoir) to self-worth and the pitfalls that kill our attempts at racial justice, in stories that bear witness to the complexity of America's social fabric - from Black Cleveland neighborhoods to private schools in the middle-class suburbs, from prison walls to the boardrooms at majoritywhite organizations. This book is an illuminating look at how white middle-class Evangelicalism has participated in an era of rising racial hostility, inviting the reader to confront apathy, recognize God's ongoing work in the world, and discover how Blackness - it we let it - can save us all."



Some reviews from readers of the book might help further:

In the same way that not everyone was ready and could handle, "Between the World and Me," this is another that some will have a hard time with. It was not meant to comfort white people. It's written to share a black experience. With that being said, if there is one book that could most accurately define my Christian black womanhood... my thoughts, my pain, my fear, my concerns, my frustrations, my awareness that I MUST press on despite not having much to cling to for hope... it's this book. I read it in one sitting. It was that relatable. So grateful for Austin's willingness to share her perspective and a part of her story which so many of us black women can Amen to. Austin is spot on in her discussion of many workplaces. I rolled my eyes multiple times in frustration on her behalf as she recounted comments and challenges from coworkers, even those alleging they meant no harm. An overhaul of workplace culture is necessary, particularly in the corporate world — Too often companies issue distant, jargon-laden

statements, hosting a round table discussion once or twice, claiming they offer an inclusive environment and have zero tolerance for racist behavior/ comments, then continuously move on until the next instance of tragedy (that they become aware of). White people should be speaking less and listening more, at work and elsewhere, everywhere.

I listened to the audiobook, narrated by Austin herself, which I highly recommend. While short in length, I listened to it in small parts over the last week, taking in each piece of her story. I'm Still Here highlights several ongoing issues in our society and serves as a timely reminder we have much to learn — Change doesn't happen by hoping, it happens through action. (Brandice on Goodreads)

This is a powerful book. Many of Brown's experiences being black in a white world have echoed my own. However, they are more visceral because she lives with the double bind of being a black female. Her book is part memoir and also has elements of James Baldwin and Ta-Nehisi Coates. Her voice is unique because she focuses a lot on her interaction with white Christians, especially those who purport to be "nice" and not racist. Chapter 8-"The Story We Tell" and Chapter 14-"Standing in the Shadow of Hope" are my favorite chapters in the book. Brown has a way with words, this is clear in Chapter 14 when she writes about her relationship with "hope." (Raymond on Goodreads)
