Praying the Jesse Tree Advent Devotionals

Advent devotionals based on the Jesse Tree were mailed to Salem members and delivered to Salem Sunday School families in their December boxes. The season of Advent begins on **Sunday, November 29**.

What is the Jesse Tree? The symbol of the Jesse Tree comes from this passage in Isaiah:

And there shall come forth a rod out of the stem of Jesse, and a Branch shall grow out of its roots: and the spirit of the Lord shall rest upon him. ISAIAH 11:1-2

Each branch – each leaf on the tree – is a story deeply rooted in Scripture that tells of the relationship between God and God's people. The symbols on the Jesse Tree represent a Biblical "Family Tree," and Jesus is grafted onto the family tree of Jesse, the father of King David. The branches of the Jesse Tree stretch all the way back to the Garden of Eden, and in those branches are familiar names like David and Ruth, and Abraham and Jacob.

As we have been studying Old Testament stories through our Sunday School curriculum and Wednesday night Bible study of The Jesus Storybook Bible, continuing these stories through Advent devotionals is a reminder of how we are all part of this "family tree" and the powerful love of Christ for this – our – family!


Ulrich Family Update

Blood Pressure

Most of the time, high blood pressure (or hypertension) has no obvious symptoms to indicate that something is wrong and many people don't even know they have it. A variety of symptoms may be indirectly related to, but are not always caused by high blood pressure, such as blurred vision, facial flushing, or dizziness. If you experience any of these symptoms, please notify your primary care office as they can also be signs of other health issues.

High blood pressure can develop slowly over time and/or can be related to other issues. It cannot be cured but can be managed effectively through lifestyle changes and, when needed, medication. The best ways to protect yourself are being aware of the risks and making those changes that matter. Some risk factors that you cannot change are age, gender, race, and family history so work on those changes that you have control over by:

- Eating a well-balanced diet that's low in salt
- Limiting alcohol
- Regular physical activity
- Managing stress
- Maintaining a healthy weight
- Quitting smoking
- Taking your medications as prescribed
- Working with your health care team

Also often asked regarding blood pressure is "what do those two numbers mean?"

- Systolic blood pressure (the top number) indicates how much pressure your blood is exerting against • your artery walls when the heart beats.
- Diastolic blood pressure (the bottom number) indicates how much pressure your blood is exerting against your artery walls while the heart is resting between beats.

Typically, more attention is given to systolic blood pressure as a major risk factor for cardiovascular disease for people over 50. In most people, systolic blood pressure rises steadily with age due to the increasing stiffness of large arteries, long-term buildup of plaque and an increased incidence of cardiac and vascular disease.

However, either an elevated systolic or an elevated diastolic blood pressure reading may be used to make a diagnosis of high blood pressure. For more information go to heart.org and click on high blood pressure under health topics.

Penguins and Golden Calves: Icons and Idols in Antarctica and Other **Unexpected Places** by Madeleine L'Engle Despite protests and warnings from friends and family, author Madeleine L'Engle, at the age of seventy-four, embarked on a rafting trip to Antarctica. Her journey through the startling beauty of the continent led her to write Penguins and Golden Calves, a captivating discussion of how opening oneself up to icons, or everyday "windows to God," leads to the development of a rich and deeply

spiritual faith.

L'Engle explains how ordinary things such as family, words, the Bible, heaven, and even penguins can become such windows. She also shows how such a window becomes an idol-a penguin becomes a "golden calf"-when we see it as a reflection of itself instead of God.

With delightful language, insightful metaphor, and personal stories, L'Engle brings readers to a deeper understanding of themselves, their faith, and the presence of God in their daily lives.
