Adequate Sleep

We often concentrate on nutrition and physical activity when thinking of our health and well-being, but sleep is also important for optimal health for all ages. Adequate sleep is not only

necessary for general good health but also helps to fight infection, maintaining metabolism of sugar to prevent diabetes, and helping us to perform effectively and safely at school, work, and home. Sleep timing and duration affect several functions of the brain and body that are critical to maintain individual health and inadequate sleep can lead to increased risk of heart disease, high blood pressure, obesity, diabetes, and depression. Some natural approaches to improve sleep health include:

- Avoid stimulating agents such as nicotine and caffeine
- Avoid heavy meals or alcohol late at night
- Sleep in a dark room
- Develop a sleep routine which includes a regular time of going to bed every night
- Evaluate the comfort of your sleep space such as temperature, mattress firmness
- Try relaxation techniques, calm music, meditation, prayer, relaxing book
- If you can't sleep, get up and do something quiet for awhile
- There are herbal supplements to try but do not forget to include these on your list of medications and discuss with your healthcare team

WHY ARE SOCKS SO IMPORTANT TO THE HOMELESS?

Everyone deserves the basic comfort and safety that comes from equal access to showers, bathrooms, and laundry facilities. Access to hot showers and clean clothing has always been critical to the health of our homeless community members living on the streets and other places unfit for human habitation.

The need for proper hygiene is now more important than ever, especially for a population who are at high risk of contracting COVID-19. Since the start of COVID-19, many individuals experiencing homelessness have had limited access to facilities with running water and basic hygiene supplies while being at a higher risk of developing hygiene related illnesses.

PHOENIX COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT SERVICES

Phoenix Community Development Services is a leader in the All Continuum of Care effort partnering multiple nonprofit and civic organizations in our community to address the needs of homeless people in our community.

HOWIE is a self-contained winterized unit that features two complete bathrooms with showers, laundry facilities, and a wheelchair lift. By assisting unsheltered individuals without access to these types of facilities, HOWIE will provide vital services on location throughout the community. It will also provide a fresh start for those in need by connecting people to critical resources through the Heart of Illinois 2-1-1



Information and Referral Service. HOWIE will help move homeless individuals onto a path to stable housing through vital resources such as emergency shelter, case management, mental health services, workforce readiness support, and more.

in providing our population
experiencing homelessness
with a new level of care that
empowers independence,
fuels optimism, and
improves health – not just
physical health, but also selfesteem and mental health."

Socks donated by the Salem family will be given to individuals and families who use the HOWIE mobile unit and distributed throughout all Phoenix Community Development Services outreach programs. Salem members are encouraged to visit www.phoenixcds.org to learn more about collaborative community efforts to serve the needs of the homeless.

This past year during the pandemic, the need has been great due to economic instability and other stressors influencing peoples' lives. Salem will be collecting the following items on **Saturday, March 27 from 10am to 11:30am** at a curbside drop off at church. (If you are unable to donate items, monetary donations will be collected on the 27th or can be mailed to the church office. Checks should be made payable to Salem with "Crittenton" marked in the memo line.)

- Comfortable pants (3M-5T)

The Crisis Nursery provides child abuse prevention services for children from birth to six years; through emergency intervention and respite care, crisis counseling, and support services to families facing stress related to domestic violence, parenting challenges, mental health issues, and other situations that put children at risk. In turn, parent stress levels are reduced, parenting skills increased, and children are safe. Family stability is improved while children are in a safe environment.
