<sup>1</sup>Long ago God spoke to our ancestors in many and various ways by the prophets, <sup>2</sup>but in these last days God has spoken to us by the Son. – Hebrews 1:1-2

hese words are part of the first reading for October 3 and also the words shared after the readings in the liturgy of Evening Prayer. They remind us that God's word, shared by the prophets, is the same word that centuries later took on flesh and brought the very presence of God near in Jesus. It is a connection of prophetic language that prepared people for a time when Jesus would walk the earth and make known God's great love for the world. And even when Jesus did come, he did not fulfill the promises many expected. Many refused to pay attention to the many ways in which the word was revealed in new ways and rather than expanding possibilities, many people turned back to old ways, fashioned images and adhered to practices that did more to preserve the old rather than seeking truth in the message that would prepare for a new and more abundant time. Some were so oppressed and so desperate that they eagerly and gladly welcomed Jesus and his new invitation to follow him. While others were rooted in tradition and the need to continue what had always been done, that they missed seeing the new covenant Jesus had come to fulfill.

It is easy to find fault with the leaders of Jesus' day and shame them for not accepting the expanded message of the gospel to a wider audience. Who would want to go back to ways that excluded and limited access to the God's loving embrace for all people? Who would not want to look into the future with a renewed heart to experience the gifts and blessings of God in new and fresh ways?

In many ways, we are not that different from those who first encountered Jesus. Some of us are eager to embrace new things and find new ways of connecting people into the ministries of the church while others of us have visions of the past where we long to return. When the past has memories of full churches, engaged and active families and numerous in person activities, it is understandable that repeating what has always been can give the impression that it will automatically translate into what is comfortable and familiar. It is also reasonable, however, to believe that it is likely some things have changed over the years and there is a need to adapt to those changes and consider new ways of being church together. For example, this pandemic has taught me that there are numerous individuals and families who have appreciated online opportunities and feel very connected to their church and one another even while not being physically in the building. A recent survey indicated that an overwhelming number of people believe ministry needs to include a blended option of both in person and virtual opportunities as we move into the future.

I am happy to say we have learned a lot over the past many months and now have technology and media platforms that offer resources and connections via zoom, livestream, Facebook, website, email as well as print materials such as this *Bugle* issue. So, we can be church, well connected, and informed and have the option of connected in person, with computer, iPad/tablet or cellphone. While this has and continues to be a challenging time, there is hope in future possibilities and I am thankful God is still speaking in new and various ways.

God's people are always on the move. We're people of Good News! We're people of love and service! We're people who trust in the Lord's plans for us!

We most certainly know that changes are upon us. But rather than fear those changes, we are looking to the Holy Spirit and to this amazing congregation of God's people to bridge to the future that God is preparing.

Three years ago we launched our Renewing God's House Together appeal for the now completed building renovations. We're eager, of course, to "move in" and get going on ministries and activities and a full experience of this place which is a center for God's mission! We'll get there! But it all takes thoughtful, faithful courage and planning as we move forward bridging to the future.



"For I know the plans I have for you, declares the Lord, plans for welfare and not for evil, to give you a future and a hope." - Jeremiah 29:11

Mission always takes resources. It's how Christ's church works. Resources of time, talent and treasure will be central as we seek to "Renew God's Mission." There are a number of ways we'll do that. One is that on October 31st, we launch a 12-month bridge appeal in order to further fund the building renovations which have been completed; and we will also invite your financial support for our 2022 Salem ministries. You might call these two things "pledges" or "commitments" or "estimates of giving." We hope you see your faith and values and passions expressed through our shared ministries and mission!

# Salem's Internet Ministries Survey ... what did we learn?

Thanks to all who took our recent Internet Missional Assessment Profile survey! While we've certainly known the importance of our Sunday (now streaming!) worship services being shared online, we didn't know a whole lot more than that. The survey gave us some insights that are crucial for us as we chart the path forward for Salem ministries.

Things are changing! While that's always been the case, the pandemic has been felt in so many ways in our church's life. And, with all this change, "Fear not" are words that we hold on to. The Lord is with us. God knows the path forward. The Holy Spirit has good things in store for us. And, perhaps most importantly, Christ's ministry calls us to trust the gospel, use our gifts, reach out in love, keep the faith, bless others, and learn how to be creative and relevant and faithful in response to a changing reality, knowing that the Lord is our firm foundation in all we do.


A few discoveries that have caught our attention include:

- · 58 people took the survey, with 79% of them being at Salem for more than 10 years
- · 67% participate in online ministries at least weekly, with another 24% a few times a month
- 91% shared that they have a greater sense of being connected to Salem because of our online ministries, while 79% indicated their sense of belonging is deepened.
- · Just less than half (49%) experience stronger relationships, while 15% said no, and about a third were on the fence.
- · 83% had a sense of being united around a shared purpose.
- · When asked why respondents started to engage our online ministries, **60%** said it was the only way to connect with our congregation. And when asked what affected people's continued use of online ministries, the following were top responses: **57%** Convenience; **48%** Quality of Content; **47%** Allows for more ways to connect with Salem Lutheran Church.
- · Top things that respondents named as ministry now valued include: **71%** Convenience; **66%** Quality of Content; **52%** Increased ways to connect; **48%** Quality of Production; **34%** Feeling valued part of our Online Community.
- · The impact/effectiveness of respondent's online experiences include: My faith is nurtured -90%; I encounter hope for the future -62%; I feel supported in daily life -57%; My sense of purpose is nurtured -45%.
- · Future considerations revealed that just over half (53%) were on the fence as to whether online experiences will lead people into deeper engagement with Salem, while a full 89% expressed support that we continue to develop and grow our online ministry.
- $\cdot$  Finally, when asked how members intend to connect to Salem in the future, **86%** said that they will through both online and in-person opportunities.

Salem's Council, Staff and others will use this input as we give shape to future ministries, the application of our resources, and discuss how best to be faithful to the gospel and our mission to "Grow People in Christ to Love and Serve."

A Bridge to the Future is language we're using not only for our upcoming bridge appeal and stewardship appeal this fall, but also for some of the visioning we'll be doing together in the coming year as we move forward. Things are changing, yes. But with the leading of the Holy Spirit, we are not fearful about that change. Rather we are called to embrace new ways of being Christ's church, of sharing the gospel, responding to those in need, and connecting with one another as a family of faith. Watch for more as we move forward together!

# **Check Out NEW Online Resources for Sunday School**



Our book for October is: *A Witness – The Haiti Earthquake, a Song, Death, and Resurrection* by Renee Splichal Larson. Renee Splichal Larson is an ELCA pastor. Born and raised in North Dakota, Renee is a graduate of Concordia College, Moorhead, Minnesota, and Wartburg Theological Seminary, Dubuque, Iowa. She is married to Jonathan Splichal Larson, who is also a pastor in the ELCA, and their son is named Gabriel. Renee and Jon are both survivors of the 2010 Haiti earthquake. *A Witness* is Renee's first book.

The 2010 earthquake in Haiti buried Renee Splichal Larson in concrete rubble, killing her husband and leaving her a widow at age 27. Surviving only to be overwhelmed by loss and trauma, she wondered if life was still possible for her. Even as she trained to become a pastor, her faith in a loving God was shaken and battered by the earthquake that devastated Port-au-Prince and took the lives of many thousands. This is Renee's moving story of love, grief, survival, and new life. It is an account of the lives of three young people, their experience of the challenges, beauty, and hospitality of Haiti, and the tumult that overthrew all they held dear. After years of struggle and healing, aided by remarkable signs of the love and presence of God, Renee offers us an intimate look at her young romance, her experience of the earthquake, and the journey that followed. Most of all, she proclaims her hard-won witness: that in Christ, love and life conquer death.

"Renee Splichal Larson provides us with a story of hope in A Witness. It is a moving, heartfelt story that had to be told. It brings with it the visceral longings of life in the face of death, relief amid despair, light in darkness. Any who have ever known pain or loss can benefit from her story. ### FROM THE PARISH NURSE, LORI REIMER, RN INFLUENZA VACCINE

get your **FLU SHOT** today!

The influenza vaccine helps prevent the flu (influenza). This is not what some people call the "stomach flu' but a contagious disease caused by flu viruses. Common symptoms are cough, sore throat, and fever. Stuffy nose,

fatigue, body aches, and headache may also occur. Flu-related complications can be bronchitis, sinus infections, and pneumonia or the flu can make other health conditions worse. The flu can occur any time but is most common in the fall and winter, so it is best to get the vaccine before it starts spreading in your community. There are many flu viruses and they are always changing. This is why each year a new vaccine is made to protect against the viruses believed to cause influenza each season. It can also provide some protection from those viruses that it does not exactly match. The flu vaccine may also be given with other vaccines. It is recommended that everyone 6 months and older get vaccinated every flu season. It will take about two weeks for the protection to begin but the vaccine does not cause the virus. There are a few cases where you should not get the vaccine so you will be screened before receiving the vaccine or you can talk to your health care provider. Other ways to protect yourself as

well as stop the spread of the flu include washing your hands, covering your mouth and nose when coughing or sneezing (with a tissue if possible then throw away), stay away from those who are sick and stay home if you are sick, and do not touch your mouth, eyes or nose.
