It will be based on the Bible verse "*May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that you may abound in hope by the power of the Holy Spirit.*" – Romans 15:13

- 1- one hole manual pencil sharpener (1/bag = 150 sharpener)
- 1 pair blunt safety scissors (1/bag = 150 scissors)

- 5 black/blue ballpoint pens, no gel ink (5/bag = 750 pens)
- 1 box of 16 or 24 crayons (1 box/bag = 150 crayon boxes)

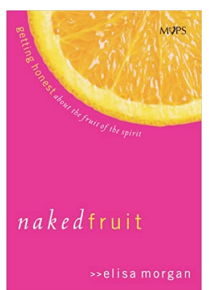

Salem Book Club will meet on **Wednesday, July 27 from 7:30-8:30pm on Zoom.** All are invited to join us as this month's book selection is about the fruit of the spirit and nicely fits in with our summer theme of "Travels with Paul." Paul talks about the fruit of spirit in Galatians 5:22-25 - "But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control; against such there is no law. And those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the flesh with its passions and desires. If we live by the Spirit, let us also walk by the Spirit.

Written by Elisa Morgan, our book is "Naked Fruit - Getting Honest about the Fruit of the Spirit" with a summary below: Fruit is the evidence that a plant has been firmly rooted and nurtured, and spiritual fruit is produced when we're rooted in God. But, as Elisa Morgan



emphatically states, the fruit of the Spirit is not just about "being nice." It's about God's fruit being expressed in your own unique personality, a concept that frees people to reject superficial standards and embrace a life of producing the kind of fruit God likes. So, the author tells readers, "strip off the nice and get naked." With a fun, fresh style of writing, Morgan thoroughly explores all the fruits of the Spirit and offers new twists on these sometimes over-worn and misinterpreted concepts. Thought-provoking questions at the end of each chapter give readers ways to evaluate their spiritual growth and get down to the business of growing.

# Capital Appeal Funds Final Distribution

The Outreach Ministry was tasked with dispensing 1% of the funds that were received as pledges for each of the 3-years of the initial Capital Appeal. In the final year of the appeal, the Outreach Ministry group solicited suggestions from the congregation for charities they support and why we might provide a donation to their charity.

We received several responses and chose three to split the funds between. Each of these organizations received donations of \$541.66. These charities provide unique opportunities to volunteer and support local programs to enhance and enrich lives in the Peoria Area. You are invited to read more about each of these worthy charities and consider volunteering.

## ALMOST HOME KIDS (AHK)

Almost Home Kids at the OSF Children’s Hospital of Illinois provides both transitional care and respite care for children with complex medical needs. What does that mean? Our kids in transitional care have often not lived at home yet. They’ve lived their lives in the hospital

and are working to go home still at a year old, two years old, sometimes older. Often our kids are dependent on medical machines – tracheostomy tubes, ventilators, central lines, oxygen, etc. They come to AHK from the hospital both so they can get stronger in a more home-like environment, and also so their families can be trained on how to take care of their kids at home. Respite care is for kids with complex medical needs who already live at home. Those kids can stay up to two weeks a year at AHK, which gives their parents

*"I've been volunteering at AHK for 3 years (AHK is 3.5 years old) as a recreational volunteer, meaning that I go in and play with the kids. I read books, play with toys, sometimes help practice walking, and just interact with the kids. They need interaction with people other than their nurses, and families can't be there all day every day, so volunteers fill in. We support the occupational and physical therapists, the child life specialist, the nurses, and the social worker. I also serve on the AHK Ambassador Team, which started about a year ago. We're still developing what exactly our role looks like, but it includes fundraising, outreach, and special projects to support the families. Our newest project getting underway is to find a few professional photographers to come in during the fall to take family photographs the families can hang on their wall or use for Christmas cards. I suspect most have never had a professional photo of the whole family. This will be a surprise gift! We're also about to embark on a major fundraising push to raise money for a central monitoring system. If you choose to support AHK, I'd like to see the funds go to one of the projects I've just mentioned, but we also have wish lists through Amazon and Target for our more regular needs. AHK is always looking for more volunteers, too. Please let me know if you'd like a tour of AHK or more information about volunteering or supporting our kids."*

a much needed break to spend time alone or with another child. These are kids who can't just have a regular babysitter. It's hard on parents and families, and we try to care for both the kids and the families at AHK.

## PETS FOR SENIORS (PFS) SHELTER

PFS Shelter is a local animal shelter for which Anna, Madeline, Matthew, and Sarah Kammerer volunteer. They have been volunteering as cat socializers for a year and half, meaning they go in once a week and pet cats, play with them, and take photos for their profiles. Sarah Kammerer is also involved in processing adoptions, helping with adoption events, co-writing the PFS Shelter Facebook page posts, make monthly "Happy Tails" videos with Mix106.9. Sarah is also on the Board for PFS Shelter, and she even was convinced to do a TV interview with WTVF.

PFS Shelter was started as a senior dog/cat to senior person shelter over 20 years ago. There was an unmet need for placement of older animals after their owners either died or went into assisted living, leaving usually senior animals with nowhere to go. The Pets for Seniors program matches senior animals (age 7 and up) to senior people (age 60 and up) with some perks: reduced adoption fee and care of the animal in an emergency being the biggest. The real perk, though, is

the companionship the animals and seniors give each other. Pets for Saving program places younger animals (kittens and cats/dogs under 7 years). PFS Shelter adopt senior animals to younger people and younger animals to senior people, too, although we try to discourage adopting a kitten to senior seniors. PFS Shelter houses 20-25 cats in the shelter on Sterling Avenue, kittens are housed in foster homes (they need around the clock care), and dogs are housed in foster homes, too, because our shelter isn't big enough and isn't zoned for dogs.

By choosing to support PFS Shelter, the funds will go to purchasing a new kennel system, so the shelter may take in more cats at a time. This new kennel system is estimated to be at least \$3,000. Additional fundraising for the kennel system will be done, and there are also wish lists on both Chewy.com and Amazon (listed as "Pets for Seniors") for our most commonly needed items (food, litter, medicines, etc.).

## PEORIA SYMPHONY GUILD

The Peoria Symphony Guild was founded in 1951 as an auxiliary of the Peoria Symphony Orchestra. It is organized under the charter of the Peoria Symphony Orchestra, a 501 (c) (3) organization a non-for-profit organization. Donations are tax-deductible. The Guild was created by a group of forward-thinking women for the purpose of providing music education to all age groups and to elevate the standard of the art of Music in the community.

The Guild has three signature Educational Outreach Programs which were created specifically for young people within a 100-mile radius of Peoria.

1. Annual Student Concert (since 1953): Over 2,000 students from grades 3rd to 12th travel up to 100 miles for a live daytime Peoria Symphony concert at the Civic Center.
2. The Young Artist Competition (since 1958): invites instrumentalists and vocalists grades 7th to 12th to compete to perform a concerto or aria to win the honor of performing with the Peoria Symphony at the Student Concert.
3. The award-winning Puppet Troupe (since 1969): Guild Puppeteers via delightful stories, performed to classical music, perform for elementary school children in this 4 county area using delightful stories like "Peter and the Wolf," "Hansel and Gretel," and "Peer Gynt".

Monies are specifically needed for each of these programs in a variety of ways. Examples would include getting the stage setup for puppet shows, which is done by local park districts. The Young Artist Competition requires piano tuning, room rental, payments for judges and award monies for winners. For the Annual Student Concert, ticket costs are subsidized as the Peoria Symphony Guild tries to keep ticket prices for all students to about \$3 for the concert. The Guild pays the Peoria Symphony for two concerts, as field trip experiences for the attending schools.

These Educational Outreach Programs have reached over 1,200,000 young people, from these surrounding counties, over this last half-century.

Salem has other members who have served on this Guild Board currently and in the past including Ellie Hansen, currently Director of Events, Nadine Williams past Director, John Day, Past President, Nan Day, and Maggie Sloter who is the current treasurer.

*"My personal involvement with the Symphony Guild started in 2013 when I became the chairperson for the Young Artist Competition and was in that role for 7 years, as well as Director of Educational Outreach for a couple of those years. I served as President of the Symphony Guild for two recent years and am currently in the Past President voting position."*

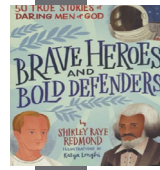

## FROM THE PARISH NURSE, LORI REIMER

### Learn More About Medications

Medications are used to treat diseases, manage conditions, and relieve symptoms. They are generally safe when used as prescribed or as directed on the label, but there are risks in taking any medicine.

Each year adverse drug events – harm resulting from medication use – cause more than one million visits to hospital emergency departments. Learning about medication safety can reduce and even prevent the risk of harm for you and your loved ones.

Start with keeping a current list of ALL your medication. This includes not only those prescribed by your health care team (HCT) but also all OTCs (over-the-counters). Herbals, ointments, drops, and "as needed" meds are included in this list. Be sure to keep this list updated and review it at every appointment with all physicians' offices.



The list should include medication name, dosage, when to take, why taking, and prescribing physician.

Know your side effects but don't obsess over them. Key rule is to notify your HCT of any abnormal changes after starting a new medication. Take only as prescribed and if you miss a dose, check with your pharmacist or HCT on the best way to stay on course.

Take your medications at the right time (and same time daily), right dose (that's prescribed for you), and never stop without consulting your HCT.

Be safe with your medications by following these guidelines as well as do not share with others (even if they're on the same medication) and keep out of the reach of children.
